THOUGHTS ON INK & EVANGELISM FROM PASTOR JOE



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, Merry Christmas! But first, please don't overlook the season of Advent, because Christmas has greater meaning and joy when we

first note how desperately the world needs a Messiah.

The Lutheran contribution to Christianity is in more than just in theology. Martin Luther helped teach the world to read and then put the Good News in the language and hands of people in fields and streets. What had been a mysterious, elitist and controlling faith, became a force for liberation, the fulfillment of callings from God, and all the blessings that followed. Luther gave the new printing presses something worth printing, and his colleagues joined him in a lifetime of educating their neighbors.

With their souls thus stirred as never before, Lutheran musicians composed truly awesome music. Christian entrepreneurs boldly created new economies where people could find win-win opportunities and expand the definitions of "neighbor" and of "love." Christian scientists were able to read other things and learn from

each other in exponentially-growing ways. Christian statesmen envisioned free and thriving people and to see paths to forge, sustain and defend such cultures. We are still far from perfect, but we less often enslave one another or wage war for earthly treasures, and more often pull together to feed, clothe and heal all who need it, whether they understand how or not.

Years ago, in my Air Force days, I learned a quote attributed to Austin "Dusty" MIller: "Man's flight through life is sustained by the power of his knowledge." I did not know who Miller was, but I know that a British Officer by that name was a hero in a Japanese Prisoner of War Camp in World War II, and he was tortured to death by a guard who hated his religious convictions. He endured quite a lot, and bore witness to still more, by knowing what he knew as a sustained Christian. Such things happen in wars. His life and death still have meaning in Christ.

On to Ink. In the Pandemic, many more people are working from home. Thus far more printers each produce a few pages a day, rather than a few busy office ones going non-stop. The demand for ink and toner is thus immense, and hiking the costs to make modest publications such as church newsletters and bulletins.

This hits our church in two ways. First, our church exists to reach people that are not in it – we use our printer to extend the Good News around the community, and there are usually plenty of copies of everything available for our readers to share with neighbors and friends.

Second, some of our members are not in church as much now, so we've relied more on print as we dutifully remind them to seek and keep God's priorities in mind.

You can help. First, if you can receive and read the Bell and/or the Sunday Worship bulletin in electronic (PDF) form, e-mail me, and I will take you off the postal mail list. Second, you can then forward these pages to others in the community and beyond. Third, you can support such operations with money, content, and time.

This edition is thus a bit shorter. But in the future if we can convert more of our content to electrons instead of toner, we can then continue to strengthen the content.

People join churches when they each realize a personal responsibility to grow and learn as disciples, done best alongside others. A church thus exists to organize, train and equip Christians of all ages to proclaim the Gospel.

So, if you are not much of a reader, make sure you are doing two other things more diligently. First, please find

other ways to keep your head and your heart in the Word. That is part of what a Worship Service is. Some also learn from programs about faith on TV, radio and podcasts. Others give more time to deeper conversations with spiritually wise friends and teachers. Don't let the oil in your lamps run low.

Second, remember that those national television evangelists may be great at feeding you, but you are called to feed as well as to be fed. In fact, we grow better that way. Local churches organize to do this together more effectively. We can love the neighbors as no TV evangelists can, if we seize the day with courage.

I can use toner cartridges to remind the local Lutherans that, as in every age, we currently need courage and love more than the stuff we think we need, and that the world still desperately needs to know about the true Messiah.

Jesus is coming into the world. Know it! Share it! Rejoice, repent, and be courageous!

FROM LUTHER'S SMALL CATECHISM THE APOSTLE'S CREED – THE FIRST ARTICLE: CREATION

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

Martin Luther Writes:

"What does this mean? I believe that God has made me and all creatures; that He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, an all my members, my reasons and all my senses, and still takes care of them.

"He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all that I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life.

"He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil.

"All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him.

"This is most certainly true."



Pastor Joe's Thoughts on Luther and the Creed:

First, Luther entitles the three parts of the Apostle's Creed: "Creation, Redemption and Sanctification." This first sentence in the Creed is the entirety of the part on Creation. It proclaims a belief in a Creator God of all things, and equates this God to a father. This means that the believer attributes to the Creator at least some of the qualities (we hope the better ones) that one would attribute generally to a father: a love for, and sense of responsibility for, that and those created.

Second, Luther, in this concise guide, tries to make the idea of a creator relevant in the life of the individual

believer. He talks about what God gives us in particular, how he provides for us in particular, how he loves us in particular. This is philosophical. It guides us in how to live accordingly.

Well and good, but also note that a God of all creation must surely also be very interested in particulars of others. God creates, provides for and loves our neighbors too. He does it for lemurs in Madagascar and for the rocks and gases and whatever else is out there in Alpha Centauri.

Luther rightly wanted to bring an awareness of God's awesomeness into our lives, but the next step is to bring our lives into the awesomeness of God's living Creation. Luther was focused on Philosophy, while we can also consider the Cosmology of Creation, the study of how things came to be ("Big Bang," "Intelligent Design," assorted Time-Space Astrophysics theories, etc.). Perhaps I am just latching on to fancy ways to say "faith" and "science" can work together to create wisdom.

Creation should, by its very awesomeness, inspire us: fill us with breath and life and holy zeal. The verb "create" implies that it is done for a purpose, and we are created such that we can seek to understand and live out our individual and collective purposes. The mere existence of Creation, coupled with our realization of it, thus implores us to be good and intentional stewards of that which we can and should influence.

When we think about the Universe and our stewardship roles, some think we have immense responsibilities. But we probably should start smaller. For example, such big thinking does not call us to be disciples of a climate change religion, or whatever pseudo-science / pseudo-religion / pseudo-scam comes next. That is hubris. We should probably try to recycle though, when we can.

There are two aspects of Creation we too often forget about in that debate. First, God also created in us a respect for truth and integrity, and those who claim "the science is settled" speak a vicious, self-serving, and ultimately foolish oxymoron. Science is a process by which we unsettle things in order to learn more, and I will continue to believe that until someone proves me wrong!

Second, if there is a Creation, then we should think more about the Creator. Some say that the Bible or the scriptures of other faiths are insights about the Creator. Some say such writings are just myths telling us only a little about ourselves. But if we are a part of Creation, a part that we can study, maybe our occasional but persistent need to ascribe existence to a Creator is itself a hint about the existence of the Creator.

Some interesting stories about relationships have explored the tension and interrelationship of diverse but interacting world views: Watson and Holmes, Kirk and Spock, and Tigger and Owl come to mind. Maybe that is part of why there are two creation accounts at the beginning of the Bible, at Genesis 1:1 and at 2:4. We Christians can live with that tension. We are tough. We are created that way.

We'll leave the fact that there are four Gospels for next month, when we join Luther in considering the Creed's professions on Redemption.

Saint Bartholomew "is known as having been among the zealots of Israel at the time of his calling to discipleship by Our Lord. His symbols of a fish laying atop a book are used to emphasize his role as a fisher through the



gospel. Tradition tells us that he and Saint Thaddeus labored together in Persia (now Iran) on behalf of the Gospel. These two apostles were martyred in Persia on the same day, October 28th, which is now their combined feast day. This window is presented to the glory of God in loving memory of Mr. James Lamar Cottrell and in honor of Mrs. Alene Widerhold Cottrell by their children, family and friends. This window was created by Robert & Elizabeth Foster of Foster Stained Glass Studio, Bryan, Texas."



HYMN HISTORY OF THE MONTH: SILENT NIGHT

It was Christmas Eve in the Austrian Alps. At the newly constructed Church of St. Nicholas in Oberndorf, a Tyrol village near Salzburg, Father Joseph Mohr prepared for the midnight service. He was distraught because the church organ was broken, ruining prospects for that evening's carefully planned music. But Father Joseph was about to learn that our problems are God's opportunities, that the Lord causes all things to work together for good to those who love Him. It came into Father Joseph's mind to write a new song, one that could be sung organless. Hastily, he wrote the words, "Silent night, holy night, all is calm, all is bright..." Taking the text to his organist, Franz Gruber, he explained the situation and asked Franz to compose a simple tune.



That night, December 24, 1818, "Silent Night" was sung for the first time as a duet accompanied by a guitar at the aptly named Church of St. Nicholas in Oberndorf.

Shortly afterward, as Karl Mauracher came to repair the organ, he heard about the near disaster on Christmas Eve. Acquiring a copy of the text and tune, he spread it throughout the alpine region of Austria, referring to it as "Tiroler Volkslied." [Tyrolian Folk Song] The song came to the attention of the Strasser family, makers of fine chamois-skin gloves. To drum up business at various fairs and festivals, the four Strasser children would sing in front of their parent's booth. Like the Von Trapp children a century later, they became popular folk singers throughout the Alps.

When the children – Caroline, Joseph, Andreas and Amalie – began singing "Tiroler Volkslied" at their performances, audiences were charmed. It seemed perfect for the snow-clad region, and perfect for the Christian heart. "Silent Night" even came to the attention of the king and queen, and the Strasser children were asked to give a royal performance, assuring the carol's fame.

"Silent Night" was first published for congregational singing in 1838 in the German hymnbook, Katholisches Gesang — und Gebetbuch für den öffentlichen und häuslichen Gotttesdienst zunächst zum Gebrauche der katholischen Gereinden im Königreiche Sachsen.* It was used in America by German-speaking congregations, then appeared in its current English form in a book of Sunday School songs in 1863.

Were it not for a broken organ, there would never have been a "Silent Night."

* Roughly translates as: "Catholic song and prayer book primarily for the public and domestic Holy Service, for the use of the Catholic People in the Kingdom of Saxony." Perhaps all the shorter names were already taken.

FESTIVAL DAYS - FROM SUNDAYS & SEASONS

December 7: Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, died 397. Ambrose was a governor of northern Italy and a catechumen when he was elected bishop of Milan. He was baptized, ordained, and consecrated a bishop within one week's time. While bishop he gave away his wealth and lived in simplicity. He was a famous preacher and is largely responsible for the conversion of Augustine. He is also well known for writing hymns. On one occasion, Ambrose led people in a hymn he wrote while the church in which they were secluded was threatened by attack from Gothic soldiers. The soldiers turned away, unwilling to attack a congregation that was singing a hymn. Ambrose is credited with authorship of three hymns in the Evangelical Lutheran Worship, including "Savior of the Nations Come" (ELW 263, LBW 28).

December 20: Katharina von Bora Luther, Renewer of the church, died 1552: Born to an impoverished nobleman, when Katharina (Katie) was five her mother died and she was sent to live in a convent. She later took vows as a nun, but around age twenty-four she and several other nuns who were influenced by the writings of Martin Luther left the convent, and she eventually married him. Six children were born to Katie and Martin. Though initially Luther felt little affection for Katie, she proved herself a gifted household manager and became a trusted partner. She was so influential that Luther took to calling her "my lord Katie."

[Editor's note: As a nun, Katie was trained to brew beer, a practice she kept up throughout her life.]

December 14, 1911 - Norwegian explorer Roald Amundsen became the first to reach the South Pole.

December 15, 1791 - The Bill of Rights became effective following ratification by Virginia.

December 16, 1773 - Colonial activists disguised as Indians dumped 342 tea crates into Boston Harbor.

December 17, 1903 - First powered, controlled airplane flights by Wright brothers, near Kitty Hawk, NC.

December 18, 1916 - World War I Battle of Verdun ends; 543,000 French and 434,000 German killed.

December 19, 1998 - House of Representatives impeached Bill Clinton, for lying and obstructing justice.

December 20, 1989 – U.S. invasion toppled the regime of Panama's narco-dictator Manuel Noriega.
